



Founder Dr. James F. Goodwin, Jr.

James F. Goodwin, Jr., one of six children, was born in Kingston, Georgia, March 30, 1905, to Anna Sledge Goodwin and James F. Goodwin, Sr. He attended elementary school in Rome, Georgia and at the age of 12 moved with his parents north and settled in Steelton, PA. He continued grammar school and graduated from Steelton High School in 1924. Jimmy or "Brownie" as he was known, was determined to go on to school and study medicine, so off he went to Howard University in Washington, D.C. September 1924. Of course no one believed that he was going to college because he only had enough money to last approximately a month. While in college he applied for scholarship aid through various sources and all of them refused, stating that due to their constitution he did not meet the requirements. It was this experience which inspired him to start a scholarship club which could and would help deserving Negro students who needed financial assistance.

James entered the college of Liberal Arts in 1924, graduated in 1934 from Howard University, Washington, D.C., (10 years), and served his internship at St. Louis, Missouri.

In September, 1935 he opened his office as a general practitioner in Bethlehem, PA

The J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club was founded in 1935 by Dr. J. F. Goodwin, who saw a great need in the Negro community of Bethlehem. Along with practicing medicine, he preached a gospel of education beyond high school to equip young people to meet the challenges of life. In 1940, Dr. Goodwin moved to Reading, PA where he continued his work with young Negro students, people and founded the sister club. During this period he married Elizabeth Waters. Dr. Goodwin found the time through the years to remain active in both clubs. He practiced medicine until his illness forced him to retire and he departed this life on March 28, 1973.

MRS. OLIVIA CLARK



Mr. and Mrs. Harry Clark became acquainted with Dr. James F. Goodwin after he moved to Bethlehem, Pa. At that time he lived and maintained his practice from the home of Andrew Fauntleroy, which was located two doors from the Clark home on Cherokee Street.

Most of the Scholarship Club meetings were held at the Clark home. After Dr. Goodwin moved to Reading, a few years lapsed and the Bethlehem students asked Mrs. Clark to start the Scholarship Club again. The annual Graduation Programs were significant.

Each student was expected to develop and present a graduation speech before the community and their parents. Everyone was encouraged to seek education beyond high school.

Mrs. Clark was responsible for the musical programs presented. She involved the parents, who sewed the costumes which she had designed. As she taught the students to sing and dance assisted by her daughter, Mrs. Audrey Blue. Anyone who had the least bit of talent and coordination was inducted. IT WAS LIKE BROADWAY! Everyone participated. These programs were developmental as well as fund raisers. Mrs. Clark has always been an unselfish person — always giving of herself. For those who found it difficult to attend, transportation was provided. The productions and programs were held at the Jewish Community Center and the local Black Churches.

We here in Bethlehem are all the better today because of this Great Lady — Mrs. Olivia Clark.

History of the J. F. GOODWIN SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club was founded in 1935 by Dr. J. F. Goodwin, a young black physician who saw a great need in the black community of Bethlehem. Along with practicing medicine, he preached a gospel of education beyond high school to equip young people to meet the challenges of life. Years later Dr. Goodwin moved to Reading, PA where he continued his work with young black people and founded a sister club. Dr. Goodwin found the time throughout the years to remain active in both clubs. In 1956 the J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Fund was established to act as custodian for the Fund. The founding members were Mrs. Olivia Clark, Mr. William Walton, Mrs. Audrey Blue, Mrs. Rebecca Grimes Hatfield, Mr. Jacob White, Mrs. Lillian Taylor, Mr. Sampson Taylor, Mrs. Margaret Bowers. Honorary members were Mrs. Harry Clark and Mrs. Melvin Neff.

Over the years the J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club, consisting of high school students remained active as an extracurricular club in the Bethlehem Area School District until the mid 1970's. The Board of Directors created goals and activities for the J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club.

Purpose

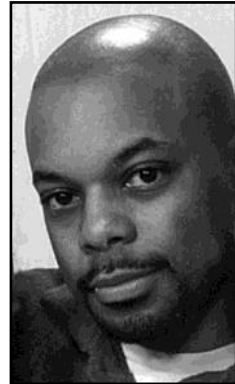

Mrs. Geneva Smith Hassell

Geneva Hassell is a former resident of Bethlehem, PA. Her work experience began here, when Mrs. Olivia Clark invited her to take a part time job after school at the University Club on East Market Street, Bethlehem. She worked as a kitchen helper. The summer after graduating from high school she was employed at the Fountain Hill factory where she sewed collars on men's polo shirts.

In the fall, Geneva attended Freedmen's Hospital School in Washington, D.C. She received a Diploma in Nursing, passed the board exam and became a registered nurse. Her first position as an RN was as a charge nurse at Emergency Hospital.

After marriage and children, she worked as a staff nurse at the Washington Hospital center. Geneva began working as a private duty nurse for a few years before intensive care units were started in hospitals. She practiced at the Washington Hospital Center, Freedmen's Casualty, Providence, George Washington University and Sibley Hospital.

In 1975, Geneva received her Bachelor of Science Degree in Nursing, from the Catholic University of America. She began public health nursing and took a position with the Visiting Nurse Association for five years.

In 1985, Geneva received her Master of Science Degree from the Catholic University of America. Geneva Hassell accepted a position as a Community Health Nurse in the D.C. Department of Human Resources working in school health. Geneva was one of the first members of the newly formed District of Columbia School Nurses Association. She served as president of the DCSNA from

2002-2004. She was awarded the District of Columbia State School Nurse of the Year on June 30, 2002.

The Sigma Theta Tau International Honor Society of Nursing at Howard University recognized and honored her for notable and outstanding contribution to nursing AS ONE OF THE 2003 100 EXTRA ORDINARY NURSES.

Geneva received recognition as a Magnet Nurse for Excellence in Nursing Services from the American Nurses Credentialing Center through Children's Hospital National Medical Center in 2010.

Geneva Hassell was welcomed to the Lumen Society of Catholic University in 2009. The Lumen Society celebrated the philanthropic spirit of their most valued alumni and friends who have made charitable gifts to the University for more than ten years. Geneva has received so many commendations over the years; it would take too much time to list them.

Geneva Hassell resides in Bowie, MD. She had been a member of the American Nurses Association and the District of Columbia Nurses Association for many years. She is a retired member of the District of Columbia School Nurses Association. Geneva attends the Ebenezer United Methodist Church of the D.C. where she has worked in the Work Area of Education for several years. She is now working with the Adult Ministries committee. Geneva still finds herself involved in philanthropic work in the community.

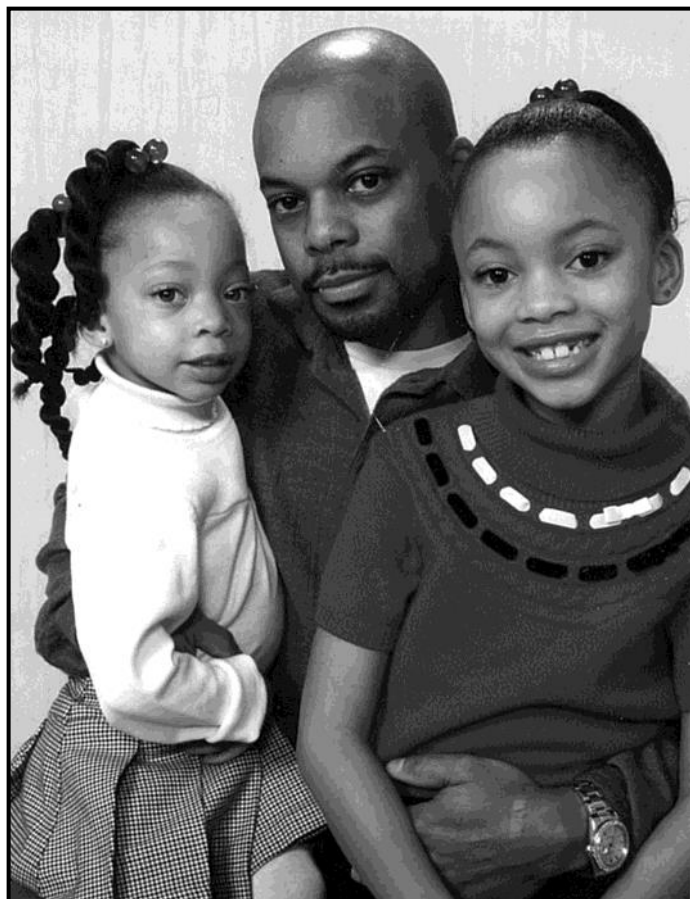

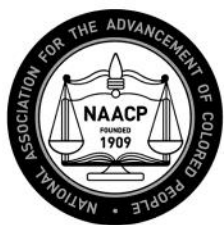

Juneteenth 1945
My Introduction to the JFG Scholarship Club
by Dr. Ernest H. Smith

One Sunday evening in June 1945, as a 13 year old 8th grader, I was totally unprepared for the service witnessed when I went with my mother to the St. John A. M. E. Zion Church. As we entered the church I recognized that the touch on the piano was that of my cousin Mayo Lanier and not that of Mrs. Mildred Armstrong. Upon entering the sanctuary I heard a choir of high school teenagers. Later I learned that I was witnessing my introduction to the J. F. G. Club, to the master of ceremony, Dr. J. F. Goodwin, and, the elegant lady that trained and directed the scholarship choir and club, Mrs. Olivia Clark. In an later era she could have sought a career as a metropolitan opera soprano.

In remembering bits of the program as it unfolded, Othelia Delvison sang *Handel's Alleluia*; she had a Marian Anderson timbre voice. Geneva Bolton from the Reading J. F. G Club played a piano solo; Robert Lee, an *Irish Lyrical* tenor sang the Lord's Prayer. Robert was a previous member of the J. F. G. Club, and was now dressed in his US Navy uniform. The graduates of the Liberty High School Class of 1945 were Margaret Johnson, June Johnson, El Rae Johnston, Donald Watson and William Brown. They sat dressed in their caps and gowns facing the audience. Each of them gave a heartfelt, well received speech. I remember Donnie Watson's humor where in his speech he placed a bet with the males in the audience using their last pack of cigarettes and the females using their last pair of nylons for barter. Remember that during the war years, 1941 –1945, those objects were more valuable than gold on the black market.

El Rae was commended for being the first black student to be accepted into the Liberty High School Glee Club, thanks to Mrs. Fitch, the music teacher, who desired to be taught by Lily Pons,

a French-American operatic soprano and actress. Donald was commended for his high academic standing and ranking amongst the males and his class.

In the back of the church tables were loaded with gifts for the graduates, given by families and friends. More importantly the church was packed with parents, friends and childless adults who came to encourage and salute the children of the black community.

For the first time I received the idea, at this viewing, of the elegance of the black community. Moreover, I understood that grateful carriage, hope, joy, community unity and involvement, family and obedient children, were required to bestow elegance to the wearer of one's clothes.

I received many gifts that night; the Johnson girls with their warm smiles and adult discussions with a 13 year old boy, me; that El Rae opened up the LHS Glee Club to blacks and the fact that Willie Brown had become fluent in German were gifts; Willie Brown along with Donnie Watson in proving themselves worthy of entering Penn State, despite their lowly economic status; Donnie had left the mark of academic excellence at LHS and the fact that Mayo Lanier's music excellence expressed that night, as an accompanist, were set before me as gifts; that Dr. Goodwin took the time away from his practice to travel from Reading to Bethlehem, and the fact that Mr. and Mrs. Harry Clark had opened their hearts and home to us, the communities children, were priceless gifts.
