

# Founder Dr. James F. Goodwin, Jr.

James F. Goodwin, Jr., one of six children, was born in Kingston, Georgia, March 30, 1905, to Anna Sledge Goodwin and James F. Goodwin, Sr. He attended elementary school in Rome, Georgia and at the age of 12 moved with his parents north and settled in Steelton, PA. He continued grammar school and graduated from Steelton High School in 1924. Jimmy or "Brownie" as he was known, was determined

to go on to school and study medicine, so off he went to Howard University in Washington, D.C. September 1924. Of course no one believed that he was going to college because he only had enough money to last approximately a month. While in college he applied for scholarship aid through various sources and all of them refused, stating that due to their constitution he did not meet the requirements. It was this experience which inspired him to start a scholarship club which could and would help deserving Negro students who needed financial assistance.

James entered the college of Liberal Arts in 1924, graduated in 1934 from Howard University, Washington, D.C., (10 years), and served his internship at St. Louis, Missouri.

In September, 1935 he opened his office as a general practitioner in Bethlehem, PA

The J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club was founded in 1935 by Dr. J. F. Goodwin, who saw a great need in the Negro community of Bethlehem. Along with practicing medicine, he preached a gospel of education beyond high school to equip young people to meet the challenges of life. In 1940, Dr. Goodwin moved to Reading, PA where he continued his work with young Negro students, people and founded the sister club. During this period he married Elizabeth Waters. Dr. Goodwin found the time through the years to remain active in both clubs. He practiced medicine until his illness forced him to retire and he departed this life on March 28, 1973.

Mr. and Mrs. Harry Clark became acquainted with Dr. James F. Goodwin after he moved to Bethlehem, PA. At that time he lived and maintained his practice from the home of Andrew Fauntleroy, which was located 2 doors down from the Clark home on Cherokee Street.

Most of the Scholarship Club meetings were held at the Clark home.

After Dr. Goodwin moved to Reading, PA, a few years lapsed and the Bethlehem students asked Mrs. Clark to start the Scholarship Club again. The Annual

Graduation programs were very significant. Each student was expected to develop and

present a graduation speech before the community and their parents. Everyone was encouraged to seek education beyond high school.

Mrs. Clark was responsible for the musical programs presented. She involved the parents, who sewed the costumes which she had designed. She taught the students to sing and dance, assisted by her daughter, Mrs. Audrey Blue. Anyone who had the least bit of talent and coordination was inducted. IT WAS LIKE BROADWAY! Everyone participated. These programs were developmental as well as fundraisers. Mrs. Clark was always an unselfish person—always giving of herself.

For those who found it difficult to attend, transportation was provided. The productions and programs were held at local black churches and the Jewish Community Center, then located on the corner of Packer and Brodhead Ave.

We here in Bethlehem are all the better today because of this Great Lady! - Mrs. Olivia Palmer Clark.


# History of the J. F. GOODWIN SCHOLARSHIP FUND

The J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club was founded in 1935 by Dr. J. F. Goodwin, a young black physician who saw a great need in the black community of Bethlehem. Along with practicing medicine, he preached a gospel of education beyond high school to equip young people to meet the challenges of life. Years later Dr. Goodwin moved to Reading, PA where he continued his work with young black people and founded a sister club. Dr. Goodwin found the time throughout the years to remain active in both clubs. In 1956 the J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Fund was established to act as custodian for the Fund. The founding members were Mrs. Olivia Clark, Mr. William Walton, Mrs. Audrey Blue, Mrs. Rebecca Grimes Hatfield, Mr. Jacob White, Mrs. Lillian Taylor, Mr. Sampson Taylor, Mrs. Margaret Bowers. Honorary members were Mrs. Harry Clark and Mrs. Melvin Neff.

Over the years the J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club, consisting of high school students remained active as an extracurricular club in the Bethlehem Area School District until the mid 1970's. The Board of Directors created goals and activities for the J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club.

#### Purpose

- To promote scholarship and develop culture in our community
- To promote better interracial understanding and fellowship
- To obtain scholarship aid, whenever possible, for our graduates
- To offer financial assistance to our students who are eligible for such aide
- To encourage advanced education
- To act as counselors in choice of vocation.
- To aid in character training in cooperation with the Bethlehem Area School District
- To uphold and promote the general interest in education



Dr. Ernest H. Smith A Story of Love

Dr. Ernest Howard Smith was a pediatric cardiologist who worked for many years at the Martin Luther King/Charles Drew Hospital in Los Angeles, California. Yet, he never forgot his South Bethlehem humble roots and would often recall the history of this special place and its people whom he loved so dearly. He was proud of the fact that he was raised in the Northampton Heights section of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania during the worst economic depression and the greatest social migration of American history. A man with a special eye on history, Dr. Smith recalled every African American student and his/her accomplish-

ments of the 40's and 50's era. He talked about Calvin and Oliver Wallace who became engineers, and

William Brown, a chemist at Fort Dietrich, Maryland. Ada Brady, Dorothy Brown, Dorothy Lewis, Othelia Delvison all became teachers. His sister, Geneva, became a nurse and his brothers Isaiah and James were educators. Pedro Boone became a lawyer, while Richard Jay earned a Yale law degree and other degrees and became principal of Freedom High School. David Jay advanced to the chief administrator of the Allentown State Hospital while Delores Williams Blue because a secretary at the Lyndon Baines Johnson White House. These were young, economically challenged African American students who were all Bethlehem High School graduates and who all attended Washington Junior High School along with Ernest and his siblings. It is also important to understand that the Black community of this era was very small and just about everyone knew each other and all their family members.

Dr. Smith talked lovingly of the influence of the J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club and its influence on "all of us kids. It was an organization that was ahead of its time. Now is the time for the African American students of today to follow those same footsteps and academic challenges of those children born during the" worst economic depression and the greatest social migration that was known to America," he wrote. Dr. Smith talked about the first time he became aware of Dr. James F. Goodwin and the first graduation service he attended. His mother took him to St. John A.M. E. Zion Church one Sunday evening in June of 1945 when he was 13 years old. There stood Dr. Goodwin at the podium acting as master of ceremony. He knew that Dr. Goodwin had taken the time from his medical practice in Reading to come to Bethlehem for this auspicious occasion of the celebration of the high school graduations of Margaret Johnson, June Johnson, El Rae Johnston, Donald Watson

and William Brown. There the assembled students were wearing their graduation robes and each one had to present a speech of his own creation.

It was there at that graduation service that Dr. Smith realized the "elegance of the Black community of Bethlehem. He came to understand that the Black community 'carried itself in a certain way' and the children of the community were 'obedient and had high aspirations because their parents wanted them to succeed in life." He recalled that the music for the program was directed by Mrs. Olivia Clark, who herself was a professionally trained vocalist and once aspired to the Metropolitan Opera. A student named Othelia Delvison had a voice similar to that of Marian Anderson's and sang Handle's Alleluia. A student named Geneva Bolton from Reading's J. F. Goodwin Scholarship Club played a classical piano solo. And Bethlehem's Robert Lee sang the Lord's Prayer.

Thirteen year old Ernest Howard Smith left that service more than ever wanting himself to become a physician. He later learned from Dr. Goodwin that it took him (Dr. Goodwin) nearly 10 years to complete his medical studies at Howard University because of financial issues. Dr. Goodwin was not the only brother in his family who became a doctor. Goodwin also had a brother who became a minister in Harrisburg, hence the Goodwin Memorial Baptist Church. Therefore, I am assuming it was because of Dr. Goodwin's influence that Dr. Smith decided on medicine for a career at a very young age. The rest is history. I could quote many persons who spoke or wrote on the influence Dr. Smith had on their personal lives. However, I will not do that. I will only quote one person, a Ms. Kebe, of California who tells us a great story: Dr. Ernest Smith and my mother Dr. Sara Kebe attended Howard University Medical School together. He knew me as a newborn and was a great friend to my mother. My parents divorced and the male role model in my life was my mother's best friend, Dr. Ernest Smith. As a teen and young adult, I went to rallies with him, marched, fought for the rights of the poor, reached out to gang members, and participated in youth events that he coordinated in Compton and South Central. I grew into the person that I am today because of the example that he set and the opportunities he provided me to lead as a young person. When I married and had children, he became their grandfather. My oldest son lived in his guest house while he was a student at USC and for some time after and my second oldest son lived in the guest house with his young family while they were making a transition to Los Angeles. Dr. Smith helped my mother during her illness and was always there for her. He was our rock and our foundation. He was a spiritually gifted man and always gave honor and praise to God. Although I now live in Dubai, I was blessed to see him last year and my daughter and I took him to a gospel play that he loved. We ended the evening with a delightful soul food meal of his favorite dishes at Roscoe's in Los Angeles. I will treasure that time with him and I can only wonder if he knew that he was ill at that time but

spared telling us. But I know that two best friends are now praising the Lord in heaven and rejoicing in heaven with the Angels. I will miss him dearly as will our family. He was a great man and we will always love and thank God for him.

I write this in memory of Dr. Ernest Howard Smith who loved Bethlehem, Pennsylvania with all of his heart and soul.
